



Don't Check the Box

Checking the box can be a slippery slope. As kids, we clean our rooms with grumbling words, hastily throwing clothes under the bed to get the job done. As adults, well, we do the same thing. Whether cleaning a room, working that nine-to-five, or studying for the next test, we are often satisfied with the minimum requirement.

The trouble is, when we approach God in this manner, we overlook the depth of what He is truly offering. We may read the Bible or a devotional and think, *All good*, *God*, *I'm ready for you to bless me now!* but the reality of knowing God runs much deeper than a to-do list. God is asking far more of us than simply going through the motions.

Throughout the Old Testament narrative, we see several instances when box-checking is confused with obedience (1 Samuel 11, Hosea 6). This age-old mistake of going through the motions stems from the common misconception that forgiveness comes from simply following the rules. Old Testament redemption was largely tied to sacrifice, but often, people missed the reality behind the ritual. The sacrifice in and of itself was not the source of redemption; it was merely a picture of what God was doing tangibly in their hearts.


You see, trusting in God and accepting forgiveness do not begin with outward actions. On the contrary, true peace with God begins in the heart. When we surrender our hearts to Him, we begin to find what we could never work to achieve. The simplest of solutions to one of life's greatest predicaments is this: To find true renewal, we must first surrender. Redemption does not come by following a list or reluctantly doing what God thinks is best (He sees your eye rolls!). It comes from giving up control and recognizing our dependence on Him.

God longs for us to obey Him because we love Him, not because of a self-righteous or proud desire to "check a box." We can strive to appear like we have it together, but we gain so much more when we submit to His will and allow Him to lead.

Obedience over sacrifice, love over ritual. These are the daily hallmarks of surrendering to God. So don't settle for the surface; don't just check the box.




